A Message from the Headteacher

Having been off isolating for ten days, it has been wonderful to get back into school this week.

I really struggled with the virus and relied on our incredible staff to pull things together in my absence. The speed with which the remote learning offering has got up and running has been really impressive and it has been great to see the examples of excellent work that staff have shared with our students.

Alongside the plans for remote learning, we have also been tasked with setting up our Lateral Flow Testing. Mrs Morland has led on this and it has been a huge undertaking, thank you to the many people who have volunteered to be part of this process when we are able to scale up the testing to allow students to return.

There are lots of unknowns about what the summer term might look like. Please be assured that we will tell you as soon as we hear anything definitive, especially about exams and assessment for this year.

The main thing we can all do for the foreseeable future is pull together and make the remote learning work well. We will blend the types of learning that are offered as although live lessons are important, they aren't always the best or most effective method on their own. Please ask for any additional support that you need and encourage your child to try and engage with as much of the learning programme as possible.

It is really important to remember that for learning to be effective you need time to rest and recharge away from screen and books. Students will be set 5 hours of learning per day. Please spend no more than 5 hours per day on the work. Just as in school, if you don't finish everything on the day just pick it up in the next lesson.

I look forward to running an assembly next week.

A Message from the Deputy Headteacher

Thank you for bearing with us as we have moved to online learning for the vast majority of our students. We thought it would be helpful to clarify what you can expect from the lessons.

All lessons will be uploaded onto Show my Homework. Students will be able to access all the resources and links they need for each of their lessons.

Lessons will be a mixture of online lessons, recorded lessons and live lessons.

- In an online lesson students will be asked to work through a series of tasks. This could, for example include completing an online quiz, working through information and tasks on a PowerPoint presentation, watching a video or completing off line tasks in the work books that students have been provided with. Staff will make it clear which pieces of work students need to upload and how they should do this.
- A recorded lesson may consist of a link to a pre-recorded explanation of the main concepts, a narrated power point or a link to a pre-recorded lesson on another site such as Hegarty Maths or the Department of Education's Oak National Academy.
- Live lessons will be accessed through Microsoft Teams. Staff will make clear through Show my Homework whether a lesson is a live lesson and will put the link for the lesson on the Show my Homework page. We had hoped that we would be able to publish a timetable of when lessons will be live but unfortunately, we are not in a position to do this. Not all lessons can be live lessons as teaching staff are continuing to come into school to work with students.

MICKEY JOHNSTONE

Mickey is part of the working class which means he doesn't have the luxury materials for clothing so they would have quite basic materials. Mickey in our piece is in his school years which is the 70s, so clothing has changed a lot since he was born. And popular materials were denim and corduroy. We would take a guess to say that they don't really buy new clothes and mostly just have hand me downs from older siblings who don't those clothes anymore.

If I was to design his clothing I would definitely put him in denim (maybe some old tiger not denim just wear the old baggy side) with a shirt (made of polyester like a school shirt) and a vest top jumper (made from dark wool with a different pattern). Finally for shoes just some old worn out boots.

Maybe for school he would keep the shirt and again they would probably wear hand me downs since they don't have a lot of money so they would have an old tie and some pair of old school trousers around the house. He would also wear the same shoes.

EDWARD LYONS

Edward Lyons is part of the middle class society so they could afford more luxury materials and their clothing might be more extravagant and a bit nicer than maybe the basic materials. Again in our piece Edward is at school and he perhaps goes to a private school which has a stricter uniform. The whole of Edwards wardrobe is probably more regal and he has a lot of suits and clothing like that.

If I was the designer I would put him in a more casual suit that still shows his social class and gives the audience a little of the divide between the rich and the poor. With Edward you can play with colours and not everything has to be dark colours like brown or black. Accessories wise, I think he would have a watch or even a pocket watch and maybe some cuff links.

For his school uniform it would probably either trousers or shorts, a school shirt, a tie, blazer and a hat of some kind.

LINDA

Linda is part of the working class and I sort of the female version of Mickey. As most of the Johnstone's can't afford luxury items we can guess that Linda's family can't either. Again like Mickey Linda would be at school by this point in the play which makes it the 70s.

If designing Linda's outfit I would put her in a dress maybe just before the knee and I would have her wear a cardigan and have her hair in plaits or pig tails. Finally I would just put her in flat shoes with some white socks.

For school I would have her wear a school shirt, a skirt and a tie with the same shoes as before.

MRS. JOHNSTONE

Mrs. Johnstone is part of the working class society which means she hasn't got the money for the more expensive materials and doesn't buy new clothes a lot so she might not own the more popular pieces of the 70s. Her wardrobe could be using clothes that were popular maybe in the 50s or early 60s.

If I was designing Mrs. Johnstone's outfit I would put her in a dress that was maybe grey or green. I think darker colours would give you the idea of them being old, dirty worn out. I would also maybe have a apron with tea towels hanging of it. I would also have her wear a cardigan and she would wear shoes with a little heel because even though she's not rich women still wore heels even to be a house wife.

MRS. LYONS

Mrs. Lyons is the opposite to Mrs. Johnstone as she is middle class. We get the idea that Mrs. Lyons is a trendy woman who likes to have all the new and popular clothing ideas. I would have thought she would like clothing items that used the materials like satin and velvet.

If I was to dress Mrs. Lyons I would dress her in a satin blouse that could possibly be navy red or even cream and she would have a black or navy pencil skirt. She would have some heels and a nice long fur coat with some silly gloves and a neckscarf. Her accessories would be a nice little watch, a necklace and earrings. The jewelry would probably be pearls or maybe some diamonds.

NARRATOR

We can guess that the narrator is middle class so probably having better quality clothes is what he would have.

If I was dressing the narrator I would put him in a black suit with black shoes. Maybe I would make him wear a hat and he could have a watch and some cufflinks.

Bradgate Sixth Form — Week 2

The last two weeks have been a really busy time for students in Bradgate Sixth Form! Year 13 students have now completed their UCAS applications and our first Oxbridge (Oxford and Cambridge University) applicants have now completed their interviews and assessments. Many students have applied to Russell Group universities for courses such as Accountancy and Finance, Aerospace Engineering, Astrophysics, Digital TV Production, Drama, Human Physiology, Law, Medicine, Politics and Zoology to name just a few!

Our Year 12 Elephant Group students are well underway with their Elephant Access Programme. Students have been given the opportunity to take part in AccessEd's Research-Based Curricula (RBCs) programme. RBCs are short tutorial coursebooks which are based on real research in unique subject areas, each written by a PhD researcher who is an expert in their field. Completing one of these coursebooks is a really rewarding opportunity for students. Students are able to explore different subjects, gain academic 'stretch' experience and build independent research and learning skills.

Year 12 students not enrolled onto the Elephant Access Programme have applied for various widening participation programmes and virtual experiences. A number of students have applied for the 'Pathways to Medicine Programme' which is run by the University of Leicester and The Sutton Trust. This programme looks to inspire and support students to explore a range of careers in medicine. All Pathways students are also offered a work placement, mentoring and networking opportunities.

Year 12 students have also been given the opportunity (through HSBC) to take part in a range of virtual experiences. HSBC have created a series of virtual events which aim to give students confidence on employment prospects and target key employability skills, giving students an advantage when looking for a career. There is no doubt that Bradgate Sixth Form students are being kept very busy at the moment!

Volunteers Required

It has clearly been a very different start to 2021 at both Wreake Valley and The Roundhill Academy. We are currently working through the plethora of information from the DFE regarding Lateral Flow Testing for Covid-19 for school staff and students.

We are confident that we will be able to commence some testing from next week, which will be for onsite staff and those students accessing the building for face to face provision.

When we open more fully, **we will need to recruit a small group of community volunteers** to add to our own 'in school' volunteers and to provide support in a number of workforce roles, including; *test assistants, test processing and day-to-day administration of our testing site.*

Training will be provided for anyone that signs up and at this stage we do not know how long we will be expected to provide this service for, but any help that you are able to provide even in the short term would be greatly appreciated. We are particularly looking for anyone with a medical or administrative background who feels that they can help us with what is quite a complex undertaking.

The situation is dynamic and guidance to schools is constantly changing, we will inevitably need to rely on volunteers to assist and support, as people's availability and the demands of the testing programme may change throughout this term and beyond.




Being in nature, or even viewing scenes of nature is known to reduce anger, fear and stress and increases pleasant feelings. Exposure to nature not only makes you feel better emotionally but it can also reduce blood pressure and heart rate and improve your overall physical health.

During the first lockdown I was able to snag myself an allotment plot 10 minutes from my house. I was able to begin preparing it to grow winter crops and I was really excited to grow my own food, I bought a second hand shed and spent time painting it, I built my own raised beds and started to grow leeks, onions and lettuces. Before I knew it my mental health had improved massively, just being outside in the fresh air calmed me down and I was able to forget the big issues in the world for a little bit.

As we are now in the Winter the ground is pretty hard and there is less to do on the allotment – although spring will soon be here and I have lots of plans! When we found out that we were facing another few weeks at home as we try to get the pandemic under control I decided to begin walking every day, my aim is 10,000 steps a day, and at the end of the school day I put my coat on (whatever the weather), stick a podcast or audiobook on and walk around my village. Sometimes it's dark but I stick to well-lit paths and it clears my head so that when I return home I feel like I have physically 'reset' myself, fresh air and gentle exercise is working wonderfully for me.

So this week try to get outside even if it's just into your garden for a walk around. Look at the trees and you'll notice they are covered in buds, by March we'll have longer days and brighter mornings and nature will be coming back to life and so, hopefully, will we.



Books ordered this week include 'Batman – a visual history', 'Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets' and 'Wonder'. Hopefully, the student who ordered Stephen King's 'Misery' isn't feeling too down-in-the-dumps and we're sorry that the book 'Don't Wipe Your Bum With a Hedgehog' is out of stock. One word of warning though, we do not advise wiping any part of your body with any animal, spiky or not!

Students order their library books online by logging onto Wreake Valley's Reading Cloud using this link <https://u007992.microlibrarian.net/> followed by their user name (which is the student's school email address) followed by their password (which is their date of birth in 8 digits, e.g. 11th of June 2006 would be 11062006).

Students can also browse the catalogue without logging in. Simply email the title and author of your chosen books with your name and tutor group to library@wreake.bepschools.org with your book requests.

Reserve your books by the end of the day each Wednesday and books will be delivered home.
