


## **Bradgate Sixth Form— B6 Growth Programme**



# Year 12 English

Our Year 12 English Literature students have been reading widely during this lockdown. Some students are choosing to use the time to read texts that they can use for their coursework, whilst some are enjoying reading for pleasure. Three of our students have kindly written short pieces to share what they have been reading.

#### The Picture of Dorian Gray

#### By a Year 12 student

I recently read *The Picture of Dorian Gray* by Oscar Wilde. This novel focuses on the character of Dorian Gray, who has his portrait painted by the artist Basil Hallward and after - realising that it will one day remind him of the beauty he has lost - voices his desire for the painting to bear the burden of age and infamy, whilst he remains young forever. Dorian Gray's wish, in fact, comes true and he falls into a life of sin and corruption, with no regard for conventional standards of morality or the consequences of his own actions. However, whilst he remains young and beautiful, his portrait grows increasingly hideous - a visual representation of his corrupted soul.

Wilde cleverly crafts the character of Dorian Gray, whose obsession with youth and vanity leads to his eventual downfall and I believe that this thoughtprovoking novel is a stark warning that there are inevitable consequences to every single behaviour. To add to this, I think that this novel is extremely relevant in contemporary society, in which we are a nation obsessed with aesthetic, and I believe that it illustrates the deceiving nature of a person's appearance and how we shouldn't be so quick to associate beauty with moral goodness.

#### The Picture Of Dorian Gray

An artist, Basil Hallward, meets the central character, Dorian Gray. Dorian is an impossibly beautiful young gentleman, who captures Basil's artistic imagination. Dorian sits for several portraits and Basil often depicts him as a magnificent, mythological figure. Lord Henry Wotton, who is arguably the antagonist of the novel, enjoys scandalising his friends by celebrating youth, and the selfish pursuit of pleasure. Lord Henry asks Basil to introduce him to Dorian. However, Basil is reluctant to do so, as he fears Henry will have a damaging influence on the impressionable young, Dorian.

Basil's fears are well founded; Lord Henry manages to upset Dorian with a speech about the transient nature of beauty. Worried that his beauty (his most impressive trait) is fading as each day progresses, Dorian is influenced to curse his portrait. In a fit of distress, he pledges his soul; if only the painting could bear the burden of age and infamy and allow him to stay forever young. As readers will know, this curse becomes true. Over time, Lord Henry's influence grows stronger on Dorian. He resolves to amend his life but cannot muster the courage to confess his crimes and the painting now reveals his supposed desire to repent for what it is - hypocrisy. Dorian picks up a knife and destroys the painting. His servants enter to find the portrait unharmed, and see their master - an old man, horribly wrinkled with a knife plunged into his heart.

However violent Oscar Wilde's novel may be, I truly believe it is such a great read! Not only does Wilde leave behind an important message - whatever malicious intent an individual may have, it is inevitable that it will catch back up with you - but this book also transports your mind back to the 19th century, due to its fantastic imagery and description.

#### The Final Empire: Book One

#### **By Jessica Wright**

For a thousand years the ash fell and no flowers bloomed. For a thousand years the Skaa slaved in misery and lived in fear. For a thousand years the Lord Ruler, the "Sliver of Infinity," reigned with absolute power and ultimate terror, divinely invincible. Then, when hope was so long lost that not even its memory remained, a terribly scarred, heart-broken half-Skaa rediscovered it in the depths of the Lord Ruler's most hellish prison. Kelsier "snapped" and found in himself the powers of a Mistborn.

To put it simply, if you haven't read the 'Final Empire' yet, read it. Whether you are new to the world of fantasy or are well versed in the fantasy world, this book series is one of the finest and most easily accessible fantasy series out there. The author, Brandon Sanderson, has created a new magical system that has a scientific and biological reasoning to it that makes it feel as though such things could be possible. The author has cleverly spent his time creating Allomancy and the myths and religions in this series. For a novice reader, whilst the story is complex, the language and writing are simple and direct therefore anyone can pick up these books and enjoy reading them.

## **Science and Engineering Club**

#### Make your own indicator

An indicator is an incredibly useful chemical. When an indicator is added to another substance, it will change colour depending on whether it is an acid or alkali. This can be important for industrial chemists who want to do reactions at a certain pH or gardeners as different types of plant prefer different conditions to grow in.

It is an analytical chemist's job to analyse substances.

#### This week's challenge

Can you make your own indicator to analyse household substances?

#### Method



Chop a 2 cm slice of red cabbage Place the chopped cabbage in a pan and cover with water Simmer for 10 minutes Leave to cool for 30 minutes

Place a small amount of each substance you want to test in a small glass or plastic container Pour a small amount of your indicator into each substance and watch the colour change.

#### No red cabbage -no problem

You can make an indicator from other substances including red onion, beetroot,

aubergine, blueberries, cherries and even tomatoes.

## Math's Debate - Jaffa Cake - A biscuit or a Cake?








In French: All year groups have taken part in Live games individually and as teams. These games have been reinforcing the vocabulary and structures from their online learning.

## Careers—Miss Kirkpatrick's story

Any dreams of becoming a lawyer were squashed during a particularly humiliating encounter with my careers' adviser back in 1997 – "that profession is NOT for the likes of you, young lady".

Back to the drawing board. I knew I wanted a career that allowed me to help people, so I went to college and undertook a pre-nursing course; I then found my first job in a nursing home before moving to Leicester.

I began working in the Children's Hospital on the children's cancer ward, which had its own operating theatre where the children underwent treatment. I was subsequently encouraged to train as an Operating Department Practitioner and qualified in 2006; I spent the next 10 years working at the Leicester Royal Infirmary in trauma orthopaedic theatres as an anaesthetic and scrub practitioner.

When I became a single parent, committing to the shifts in the hospital became impossible. I began working at Wreake and saw this as an opportunity to study law simultaneously. I had instructed a barrister myself to represent me in the family courts during a distressing time of my life. I watched them stand up and fearlessly fight for my son and me and at that point I decided to become a barrister.

Six years later, I am about to complete my law degree with the Open University and have been accepted into Nottingham Law School to undertake my Barristers Training Course, combined with my Masters. I have just applied for Pupillage, which can only be described as the most torturous experience of my life – the pressure was immense but will be worth it in the end.

The moral of the story - have faith in yourself and your capabilities, if you want something enough you will achieve it.

In the end, life is a gift and an adventure but always remember you are brave, strong and kind and you can do anything you put yourself up for.




