Testing at home throughout the Easter holidays for schools and colleges

Following the success of the asymptomatic testing programme on the return to school and college, it is vital to keep testing at home throughout the Easter holidays and into the summer term.

- test twice a week at home from now on (all those who are able to)
- report results online as positive, negative or void. This information is critical in helping us to understand the prevalence of the virus across the country
- continue to test twice weekly over the Easter holidays
- test before returning to school or college for the summer term, either the night before, or morning of, the first day back, to find and isolate any positive cases

Catering Facilities from 12th April

Our School Meals service will recommence on Monday 12th April. All year groups will be able to access the canteen; Years 10 & 11 at break time and Years 7, 8 & 9 at lunchtime.

Students MUST have a wisepay card. If they do not have one they will need to request a replacement from their tutor. A replacement card costs £3 so we strongly recommend that students check to see if they have a card at home before they order a new one. The cost of the new card will automatically be deducted from the student's Wisepay account.

Replacement cards will be available to collect from Student Reception when we return to school on Monday 12th April.

Please ensure that your child has sufficient credit on their account in readiness for any purchases after Easter. Please bear in mind that if your child requires a new Wisepay card, £3 will automatically be deducted from your balance.

Wreake's Diverse Book Awards hosted by the KS3 Book Club

- Religion

We believe that reading diverse novels is important as it can change your perception about how you see things in life and it promotes those authors that are being setback sometimes, due to their gender, race, sexuality or religion. In addition, it helps us to learn new things about different cultures, what people think and how others may view life.

After Easter, we will be working on creating our display to show-off our diverse recommendations. We will then host and present our Book Awards during the last week of term. Watch this space for updates!

European Youth Parliament UK Debate

In March Sarah in Year 12 was successful in representing Bradgate Sixth Form and the European Youth Parliament UK Debate and we are all very proud of what Sarah achieved. I am delighted to be able to share with your Sarah's experience:

EYPUK Experience

I thoroughly enjoyed it! The two-day experience was challenging but equally rewarding. The week before the debate we resolved any communication/ technical errors that may occur. We were later assigned to carry out research into our chosen subject. My chosen subject was about saving endangered languages. I thought (as someone who enjoys learning languages) it would be a good thing to discuss, and I deeply hoped I could 'geek' out with other language learners. (I was not disappointed). We started at 10 am sharp on Saturday with an introductory meeting where we were introduced to all the leaders and organisers (the head organiser was only 14 years old!) Later we separated into our individual groups. (I was CULT I) Fortunately, we began with some ice breaker games where I happily discovered all my teammates were equally or more in love with languages! From German, French Russian and Finnish. I may have had a small conversation in French...

We played games such as Scribblio where I may have embarrassed my art teacher with my 'interesting' drawing skills.

At first we dissected the question and threw ideas around and this was especially time consuming! Our main focus was how do we show non-language speakers the true value of knowing a language. The difficulty came from continuously creating an idea, agreeing on an idea, trying to apply the idea to only realise it's not an effective solution. While unwillingly returning to the drawing board. During the process we were introduced to words like IC (the problem) and OC (the solution). As a team we agreed, to revive an endangered language we need to give people reason to use it and become emotionally connected to their native language.







International Women's Day 2021

March 8th was International Women's Day which is a day that is marked annually worldwide with some of the main aims being to celebrate women's achievements and to raise awareness about women's equality. The day of observance is also a reminder of the women's rights movement and brings attention to issues such as equal pay and violence against women.



Ellie Hayton in Year 9 took the opportunity to research a woman who is inspirational to her and Ellie wrote the article below about how and why Greta Thunberg has inspired her. An excellent piece of work that fits extremely well with the theme for 2021 – 'Choose to Challenge'. After all, from challenge comes change.

International Woman's Day



Greta Thunberg is an 18 year old who was born in Stockholm, Sweden. She is a female environmental activist.

In May 2018, when Thunberg was just 15 years old, she won a climate change essay competition in a local newspaper. From that day, Greta decided that change needed to happen and needed to happen now...

In August 2018 she started protesting in front of the Swedish Parliament Building. Her aim was to get the Swedish government to meet the carbon emissions target set by world leaders in Paris, in 2015. Thunberg started regularly missing school to protest and encouraged other students around the world to do so too.

Thunberg's protest started small but it soon became viral on social media and created the hashtag #FridayForFuture. By December 2018, over 20,000 students from all across the world joined Greta's campaign and went on strike. After that, the number of students on strike rose and Thunberg made the decision to take a gap year off school to continue campaigning, attend climate conferences and join students in protesting all around the world. With Greta's main concern being the environment, she refused to travel anywhere by plane and instead travelled by train to help minimize her carbon footprint.

As Thunberg's fame grew and still continues to grow, she has called out many governments and leaders all around the world to take action to cut global emissions. Greta has spoken at many events and has left large impacts on so many people's daily lives. One of her most well known quotes is 'I have learned that you are never too small to make a difference'. She is a massive inspiration and role model to so many people across the world, especially young women and has proven to them that the impossible can happen if you put your mind to it, no matter how old you are.

Despite Greta Thunberg being a worldwide sensation, at the age of 17, she was diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome, which is a development disorder and selective mutism, which is an anxiety disorder where a person is unable to speak in social situations. However, Greta does not see her illness' as a weakness but in fact as her own special 'superpower'.

International Women's Day is a very important day for so many women worldwide whilst celebrating so many incredible successes' and at the same time continuing to highlight the importance of equality of both men and women. Greta Thunberg has accomplished so many amazing things at such a young age, which has not only impacted her life massively but she has impacted the whole world and helped to make Earth a greener, safer place. Personally, she has made me open my eyes to how drastic and quick change needs to happen if we still want to be living on this planet in years to come and also how anything is possible if you put your mind to it.

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Women's History Month

Women's History Month is celebrated annually in March. The month highlights the contributions of women to events in history and contemporary society. Emily Barrow in Year 9 chose to research and create a profile for a woman she has found inspirational – Marie Curie – who is remembered for her discovery of radium and polonium, and her huge contribution to finding treatments for cancer.

The world-renowned French-Polish physicist, Marie Curie, was born on the 7th November, 1867. The physicist is most famous for her work on radioactivity and twice being a winner of the Nobel Prize. She was the first woman to win a Nobel Prize and the only woman to win the award in two separate fields.

The accidental discovery of radiation by Henri Becquerel in 1896, inspired Marie and Pierre Curie to further investigate the phenomenon. They examined several substances for traces of radioactivity and found that the mineral pitchblende was more reactive than uranium. From this they concluded that it must contain other radioactive substances; from it, they were able to extract previously unknown elements called polonium and radium, both more radioactive than uranium. Their work on radioactivity earned the three of them a joint physics Nobel Prize in 1903.

After the discovery of polonium and radium, Marie continued to investigate their properties. In 1910 she managed to successfully produce radium as a pure metal, thus proving the element's existence without a doubt. She also documented the properties of radioactive elements and their compounds. Radioactive compounds became crucial as sources of radiation in both scientific experiments and in the field of medicine where they can be used to treat tumours. She was awarded her second Nobel Prize in recognition of her contribution to the field of chemistry.

Throughout her life, Marie Curie promoted the use of radium to alleviate suffering during World War 1. Assisted by her daughter, Irene, she devoted herself to this medical work. She retained her enthusiasm for science throughout her life and helped to establish a radioactivity laboratory in her native city - Warsaw. Sadly, Marie Curie died in 1934 of leukaemia caused by the radiation she had devoted her life to investigating. Her immense contribution to physics is demonstrated through her discoveries, her Nobel prizes and her influence on younger generations of scientists.

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




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RE Department

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

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

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Ms Lovegrove's Art work



During the first and current lockdown the artist Grayson Perry has presented a Channel 4 TV programme called 'Grayson's Art Club' where members of the public submit their paintings.

Our Head of English, Genevieve Lovegrove has submitted this picture along with this information:

I wanted to present the most important part of my work as an English teacher – the pupils I teach at Wreake Valley Academy in North Leicester.

My painting is acrylic on canvas with the backing enabling me to stitch 27 small masks over the faces on each image in the diptych. I chose to present the painting as a long rectangle because it links to the conventional school photograph that is traditionally updated every year. While normally these photographs change very little I wanted to convey the possibility of some of physical and emotional impacts of Covid over the last 12 months.

The two main physical impacts expressed across the year are the considerable hair growth on all the students and also the change from school uniform to pyjamas which many of them (and the staff!) have probably spent a whole day wearing.

The emotional and psychological impacts are greater, including the following:

The skin colour and hair shade changing from multi-coloured across the 27 children to one uniform shade of grey and white respectively.

The borders between the children growing from 1cm and in white to more of an impenetrable barrier in 1.5cm grey.

The masks changing from unique, multi-coloured and appropriately-sized to uniformly light blue and over-sized represents the dominance of their impact in all our lives.

The children's eyes changing from large and confidently staring ahead to very small with nervous glances to the left and right is enhanced with the eyebrows painted in a way that adds to the anxious expressions.

In order to show that not all students have been negatively impacted to the same degree I chose to keep three with the same skin, hair and eye colour over the 12-month period. To add a bit of humour, in what could have been a wholly negative depiction, I chose to put the three most positive students in Leicester City colours – wearing blue pyjamas.

Finally, one important thought struck me just a couple of days before I finished my artwork – that the depiction is not about the students themselves but about my feelings towards them. I have been a teacher for 17 years and love my job; I love teaching English but particularly love the relationships – the different personalities, rewards and challenges that I face with each new class each year. Having good relationships with the pupils that a teacher works with is, of course, critical to their well-being and outcomes and, unfortunately, teaching via a screen in an online lesson (where the students' cameras are turned off) means that my sense of them as fully rounded humans can't help but have been lessened over the last 12 months. This is particularly pertinent to me as I live on my own and the daily contact with these (representative) 27 funny, interesting and often idiosyncratic pupils is a crucial part of my sense of self. In this vein, the size of the masks and the borders between the students could be representing my distance from them, while the nearly ubiquitous grey skin and white hair could be representing their loss of individual identity in my eyes.

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

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
Book Club News



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
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Library News
